A word from the Office of the Superintendent at Seattle Public Schools





The Alliance for Education is the only local education fund to proudly serve all **104 schools** in Seattle Public Schools (SPS). The district employs nearly **4,266 educators** for approximately **49,000 currently enrolled students.** More than half of enrolled students identify as Black, Indigenous or people of color (BIPOC).

OUR PROGRAMS

Seattle Teacher Residency

We founded the Seattle Teacher Residency (STR) program in 2012 in partnership with the University of Washington, Seattle Education Association and Seattle Public Schools to recruit, prepare and retain high quality elementary and special education teachers for students furthest from educational justice in Seattle Public Schools. STR graduates reflect the diversity of SPS students and **teach in 87% of Title I schools across the city.**²

The 14-month program is intentionally designed to recruit and prepare future educators who share a passion for educational justice. Once accepted and enrolled, residents receive up to a \$26K scholarship to complete graduate coursework integrated with a 14-month mentored practicum to earn a Masters in Teaching (MIT) degree from the University of Washington College of Education. Upon graduation, they are offered a contract in SPS.

Graduates make a commitment to teaching in an elementary or special education setting for five years with ongoing community, professional development and financial support from STR. These graduates continue to increase the district's educator diversity and retention which research indicates positively impacts students' educational experiences.

OUR PROGRAMS

Right Now Needs Fund

We know when students have their basic needs met, they are more likely to succeed within and beyond the classroom. The Right Now Needs Fund works at the individual school level to provide funds to Seattle Public Schools (SPS) students and families to support their immediate basic needs such as covering the cost of clothing, meals, and shelter that are not otherwise funded in a school budget. Supported by generous investments from Amazon since 2018, the fund continues to meet student needs into its sixth school year.

In 2024, the Fund provided 14,840 instances of support, distributing funds to all schools in proportion to the percentage of students receiving free and reduced price meals. As the first line of support for many schools, the Fund saw an increase in requests for support compared to the previous year. This underscores the pressure and systemic barriers families often face when seeking support for hard-to-meet basic needs.

SPS has provided summer learning for decades, with thousands of students participating over the years. 2024 was the first year we were able to offer Right Now Needs Fund supports to keep students engaged. OUR PROGRAMS

School Fiscal Services

We serve as the fiscal sponsor for 175 PTAs, booster clubs and school community organizations across the city that raise funds on behalf of students and help bolster and maintain the quality of our schools. Providing school fiscal services allows school-serving organizations to focus their efforts and resources on fundraising, rather than administration and finance.

PTA Equity 'Fund-Shifting'

In recent years, we have been proud to support the work of West Seattle Public Schools Equity Fund and Central and North Seattle Schools PTA Alliance (CANSSPA), groups that collaborate across communities to redistribute resources more equitably than traditional private fundraising. This approach is collaborative in nature, bridging divides, sharing and expanding resources, and connecting neighboring schools together.

CANSSPA started in 2022 and works with over 15 schools north of I-90 in a 3-pronged approach to shift funds, create community advocacy, and share information about school funding. From the CANSSPA website: "Some SPS schools raise \$300,000 or more in supplemental funding for supplies, classroom support, and additional full-time teachers. Other SPS schools have no community-based fundraising whatsoever. This creates a huge equity gap throughout the district."

West Seattle Public Schools Equity Fund works with all schools in West Seattle. Both organizations were founded with inspiration from Southeast Seattle Schools Fundraising Alliance (SESSFA).



In a highly segregated city such as Seattle, the income from PTA fundraising varies widely, leading to very different opportunities and access for our students. Grassroots efforts like the West Seattle Public School Equity Fund is a great example of how to build community between PTAs and have the hard conversations with our families about the income inequalities and systemic racism that contribute to the vast differences in PTA fundraising abilities."

OUR INVESTMENTS

Thomas B. Foster Award for Excellence

The Alliance for Education administers endowed awards and grants that celebrate excellence among principals, educators, staff and counselors who are advancing racial equity and educational justice in their school community.

In 2024, we gave the Thomas B. Foster Award for Excellence to two principals who demonstrated success in promoting educational justice and racial equity at their school: Huyen Lam at Rising Star Elementary School and Eyva Winet at Nova High School. The award has been given since 1999 and commemorates Thomas B. Foster, a prominent Seattle attorney who displayed a strong personal commitment to public education.

The award publicly recognizes strides led by the principal and awards a \$25,000 grant to be utilized at the school. The selection process considers colleague and community nominations alongside school data, principal commitment and effectiveness.

Swain & Weaver Awards

The Philip B. Swain Excellence in Education
Award is given annually to teachers, counselors
or staff who promote educational justice and
racial equity at their school. The award honors
Mr. Philip B. Swain, a former teacher who was
a passionate advocate for public education
throughout his life. All recipients were publicly
recognized and awarded a \$2,500 grant to be
utilized for continuing professional development,
for travel associated with such development or for
classroom projects or supplies. Recipients must
have worked in the district for at least three years,
teaching in grades 6-12 at a Title I school.

The Adrienne Weaver Science Teaching Award is given annually to a science teacher who promotes educational justice, racial equity and hands-on STEM learning at their school. This award honors Ms. Adrienne Weaver, a former educator who had a love for teaching and science and believed in hands-on learning. The recipients was publicly recognized and awarded a \$5,000 grant to be used at their discretion. The recipient must have worked in the district for at least three years, teaching science or STEM content in grades K-8 at a Title I school.






Our Financials
